




## Why Childhood Obesity?



Nationwide, obesity rates have tripled over the last 30 years, affecting **17%** of all children and adolescents.

In Florida, **25%** of children are considered overweight or obese.

Of the 26 schools in South St. Petersburg, a 2012 BMI report measuring more than 10,300 students reports **36%** as being overweight or obese.
